## **Application Questions:**

- 1. God has given every man a conscience. What is the purpose of the conscience? (Rom 2:14-15) Is having a guilty conscience a bad thing? Think through "some" of the things you have done that have given you a guilty conscience before God. What if someone says they do not have a guilty conscience? What would you say to them? Isn't the question of life how we can be freed from such a guilty conscience? What does this passage teach us about how to cleanse our conscience? (Reread Hebrews 8:12)
- 2. How does the author of Hebrews show the inadequacy of the Old Covenant in chapter 9:1-10? List the three limitations of the Old Covenant.
- 3. What does the author mean when he says that the Old Covenant only cleansed at least partially "sins committed in ignorance" in verse 7? (See Numbers 15:22-31, esp. v. 30) What was to happen to those who sinned "defiantly?" In contrast to the Old Covenant what does the blood of Jesus cleanse? (see end of v. 12)
- 4. Up to this point in the book of Hebrews, the author has gone to great lengths to show us the identity of Jesus. Can you identify at least 5 things about who He is from chapters 1-8 (specifically 1:2-4)? Why is this crucial to his argument at this point? Why did the blood of Christ and not someone else's blood have to be offered without blemish to God (Heb 9:11-14)?
- 5. What does the author mean in v. 10 when he says "until the time of reformation?" Reread Hebrews 7:11, 19, 8:7, 13. What do these passages teach us about the weakness of the Old Covenant? What was God's design for the Old Covenant? (To save? To foreshadow? To convict?)
- 6. Is your conscience clear? What must be done so that all of our guilt can be removed? (See Heb 10:19-23)

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
