"Tripping"

Where they thought they were going to get by this, I had no clue. We were all stuck making baby steps. When the mass started moving again he took a lunge forward thinking that he could get in front of me. I confess and am somewhat ashamed to admit that my old nature popped-up. With his lunge I, too, took a lunge with a longer than normal stride making sure my foot came in contact with his, in essence, tripping him. It worked. He didn't fall - that's impossible with such a crowd, but he temporarily stumbled, stopped, looked me square in the eye and angrily asked: "why do you keep tripping me?"

Quick as a whip and not natured to lie I replied: "I'm not. I only

did it once."

I don't know if it was my candor or the resolve in which I said it, but he didn't respond. In fact, he rapidly fell back into oblivion. Too bad none of my kids were around to appreciate my victory and the way I weaseled out of a potential fist sandwich.

Slipping into the old nature, unfortunately, is something I do more often than I wish. It seems to come natural. The Apostle Paul
