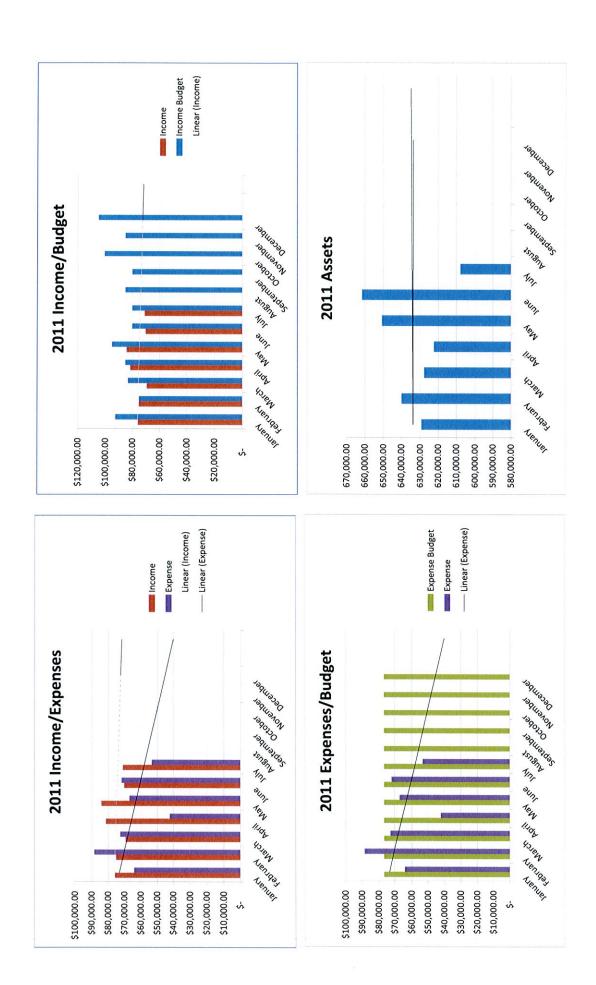

### POD (Pastor of Discipleship) Cast – Jul/Aug 2011

What an amazing month in which to serve the Lord! The Lord has shown Himself in so many ways that I never thought possible personally. One thing that became abundantly clear this month was that many times the glory of God shines brighter as you step outside the comfort-zone box. This is exactly what happened to the priests as they prepared to lead the people across they Jordan river into the promise land at the time of Joshua. Let's read the account...

"and as soon as those bearing the ark had come as far as the Jordan, and the feet of the priests bearing the ark were dipped in the brink of the water (now the Jordan overflows all its banks throughout the time of harvest), the waters coming down from above stood and rose up in a heap very far away, at Adam, the city that is beside Zarethan, and those flowing down toward the Sea of the Arabah, the Salt Sea, were completely cut off. And the people passed over opposite Jericho." (Joshua 3:15, 16 ESV)

You may remember that the last time the Israelites crossed a large body of water was some 40 years prior when they crossed the Red Sea. This, miraculous event was spawned by God using Moses to lift up his rod and wham, the sea parted and the Israelites crossed on dry land. Okay, why didn't God do it the same way? I'm sure Joshua could have found a similar stick to make it work. However, after 40 years in the wilderness, the Israelites saw God's powerful hand over and over again, so now would they trust Him by "stepping" out of the comfort zone? Could God use the feet of the priests to do the same thing Moses' rod had done? Of course the answer is yes!

This month was that kind of challenge for me...I have seen God work in many glorious ways over my life, but have grown pretty accustomed to my little ministry box and pray accordingly every day. So when God asked me to take the teens to New Mexico on a mission trip, I was not immediately willing. But praise be to God, as we stepped into the water of God's will, the way was made to walk, accompanied by a lifetime of great memories of His enabling hand to accomplish His purpose.

With that in mind, here is a quick summary of some of the ministry opportunities from July/August:

### Kids Crossing

- Cross Time Sunday School: Praise the Lord, He has brought in the teachers and assistants to fill all the Sunday School gaps!
- Early Childhood (2&3 year-olds): We continue to split the class into 2 year-olds who go to the nursery, and 3 year-olds who go to children's church. This stop-gap measure seems to be holding for now...

- Wednesday Evening Programs: Mid week programs will begin soon, please pray that the Lord will send the volunteers for this vitally important children's ministry.
- Victory Valley Summer Overnight Camp (July 17-23, 2011) & Day Camp (July 25-29, 2011): Praise the Lord for a great couple of camping weeks. The overnight camp had 3 attend, and the Day Camp 13. Praise the Lord for the various drivers that He raised up to take our children there and back.

### o Men's Bible Studies:

- Saturday mornings from 8:00 AM 10:00 AM, Don Panto is currently leading a series on the book of Galatians.
- Thursday mornings from 6:15 AM 7:30 AM, Dave VanWinkle continues in his study on the book of *Romans*.
- Women's Ministry: Praise the Lord, Laura Sommons started as Women's Coordinator on July 11. We are very excited to see how she has hit the ground running and is currently deeply immersed in preparing the ministry for the fall.

### Discipleship Support

- **Kinship:** Kinship Groups will be starting in about a month...much work needs to be done in preparation. I will begin contacting the group "shepherds" soon.
- Membership Class & Interviews: Applications continue to come in from those interested in becoming members. I will be holding a membership class again in the fall for those who have expressed a desire to join.

### **Agreement for Use of Premises**

### 1.0 Introduction

1.1 This agreement is entered into by Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church ("the Church") and Bethlehem Christian School ("the School"). This agreement demonstrates the partnership of two ministries working together with complementary purposes and objectives. The Church, having an underutilized facility during many of the normal School operating hours, enters into this agreement with an intent to encourage the School and to make a limited amount of its facilities available for School use during specific times, understanding that without the use of such facilities at very little financial cost the School would not be able to offer the proposed student fee structure.

ę,

1.2 The School is defined as officers, administration, staff, employees, teachers, aids, volunteers, students, representative agents, guests, and invitees. In this agreement, the word "School" shall be used to represent any or all such aforementioned groups.

### 2.0 Identification of the Premises

2.1 Subject to the provisions of this Agreement, the Church allows the School, and the School agrees to occupy and use, designated areas of the premises located at 3100 Hecktown Road, Bethlehem, PA. These are described in Attachment A.

### 3.0 Limit on Use

- 3.1 The premises are to be used by the School only for the purpose of operating a private Christian school as described by the School's Charter dated April 29, 1978. Use of the premises for other than this purpose is prohibited without written consent and will be considered a breach of this Agreement.
- 3.2 The School shall not assign or sublet, or in any manner transfer this Agreement or any estate or interest herein, without the express prior written consent of the Church.

### 4.0 Liability and Insurance

4.1 The School agrees to be responsible for and hereby agrees to indemnify and save the Church harmless from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, damages, liability, cost (including legal fees) and expense in connection with loss of life, personal injury, or damage to property arising from or out of the use of the premises by the School.

### 5.0 Exclusive Use, Preferred Use and Complimentary Use

- 5.1 The Church reserves the right to schedule use of all areas of the premises at its discretion. The School and the Church will coordinate in the use of those designated areas described in Attachment A as follows:
- 5.2 **EBFC Exclusive Use** The church will have sole use of those areas that function as Church Offices and support. The school will not make use of those areas.
- 5.3 **BCS Exclusive Use** The School will have sole use of those areas that function as School Offices. With the exception of emergencies, cleaning, maintenance and repairs, the Church will not make use of those areas.
- 5.4 **Priority Use** During normal operating hours throughout the School year, the School will have priority use of classrooms as designated in the BCS "Normal" and "Special" Use Report. The School may request use of these areas after normal operating hours, subject to approval of the Liaison Committee.

- Preferred Use During normal operating hours throughout the School year, the School will have primary use of classrooms and other areas as designated in the BCS "Normal" and "Special" Use Report. The School may request use of these areas after normal operating hours, subject to approval of the Liaison Committee. In the event of an emergency (such as a funeral), the Church reserves the right to use these areas with sufficient notice (forty-eight hours) to the School.
- 5.6 **Complimentary Use** During normal operating hours throughout the School year, the School may schedule use through the Church office after approval by the Liaison Committee. The Church will have priority for use of these areas.

### 6.0 Term and Renewal of the Agreement

The "Term" of this Agreement shall commence as of July 1, 2011 and shall remain in effect until June 30, 2012, and shall renew thereafter for additional one (1) year periods until such time as either party shall give notice of termination to the other at least six (6) months prior to the end of the then current Term. In the event that the Church gives notice of termination to the School, the School may extend this Agreement for one additional one-year Term or for an additional time as negotiated by both parties.

### 7.0 Reimbursement of Expenses Associated with Use of Premises

7.1 The Church will provide and pay for all utilities and services associated with the premises except as noted in Attachment B. The School will reimburse the Church a portion of these expenses according to the same attachment.

### 8.0 The School's Maintenance Responsibilities

- 8.1 The School will: (1) keep the premises clean, sanitary and in good condition and, upon termination of the agreement, return the premises to the Church in a condition identical to that which existed when the School took occupancy, except for ordinary wear and tear; (2) immediately notify the Church of any defects or dangerous conditions in and about the premises of which the School becomes aware; and (3) reimburse the Church for the cost of any repairs to the premises damaged by the School through use, misuse or neglect. Additional maintenance responsibilities assumed by the School are described in Attachment B.
- 8.2 The Church or the Church's agents may enter the premises in the event of an emergency or to make repairs or improvements.

### 9.0 Repairs and Alterations by the School

9.1 Except as authorized by the prior written consent of the Church, the School will not make any repairs or alterations to the premises. The School will not, without the Church's prior written consent, alter, re-key or install any locks to the premises or install or alter any burglar alarm system.

### 10.0 Compliance and Insurance

10.1 The School covenants and agrees, at its sole cost and expense, throughout the duration of this Agreement, to obtain, keep and maintain in full force and effect for the mutual benefit of the Church and the School, insurance in amounts and coverage reasonably acceptable to the Church, and issued by insurers acceptable to the Church. A duplicate original of the Church's certificate or binder of such insurance shall be furnished to the Liaison Committee at the commencement of the Term of this Agreement and yearly thereafter. Each renewal certificate of such policy shall be furnished to the Church at least fifteen (15) days prior to the expiration of the policy it renews. Each such policy of insurance shall contain an agreement by the insurer that such policy shall not be cancelled or changed without thirty (30) days prior written notice to the Church. The School liability should match the minimum required for the Church.

### 11.0 Violating Laws and Causing Disturbances

11.1 The School will not use the premises or adjacent areas in such a way as to: (1) violate any law or ordinance, including laws prohibiting the use, possession or sale of illegal drugs; (2) commit waste (severe property damage); or (3) create a nuisance by annoying, disturbing, inconveniencing or interfering with the quiet enjoyment and peace and quiet of the Church or nearby residents. Repeated violations could result in the immediate termination of this Agreement.

### 12.0 Shared Equipment and Set-up of Facilities

12.1 Where feasible, the Church and the School will share tables, chairs and other furnishings in the designated areas. All furnishings and equipment purchased by the School should be labeled and inventoried by the School. Shared use of other equipment such as electronics must be coordinated and agreed to in advance through the Liaison Committee.

### 13.0 Entire Agreement

13.1 This document constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties, and no promises or representations, other than those contained here and those implied, have been made by the Church or the School. Any modifications to this Agreement must be in writing signed by the Church and the School.

### 14.0 Default

14.1 The failure of the School to comply with any provision of this Agreement, which failure is not corrected within twenty (20) days of written notice by the Church, is grounds for termination of the Agreement.

### 15.0 General

- 15.1 Failure of the Church to seek redress for violation of or to insist upon the timely performance of any of the provisions, covenants or conditions of this Agreement (regardless of the length of the breach), shall not be deemed to be a waiver by the Church of any of its rights hereunder. No waiver by the Church at any time, expressed or implied, of any breach of any provisions of this Agreement shall be deemed a waiver of the breach of any other provision of this Agreement or a consent to any subsequent similar breach or breach of any other provision.
- 15.2 If any provision of this Agreement shall be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of the provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby and each and every provision of this Agreement shall be enforced to the fullest extent.
- 15.3 This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the parties hereto shall be interpreted and construed in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 15.4 The covenants, conditions, and agreements contained in this Agreement shall bind and become effectual to the benefit of the Church and the School and their respective successors and assigns.
- 15.5 The Purpose of Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church is to: "Introduce people to Jesus Christ and help them become devoted followers of Him." The Vision is to "Glorify God through heartfelt worship, Reach out to others with the love of Christ, Obey God's command to make disciples, Win others to Christ".
- 15.6 The Mission Statement of Bethlehem Christian School is:

"We are a non-denominational, Bible believing Christian school. This school exists to assist parents in their responsibility of training their children by providing a complete educational program that is biblically sound, Christ-centered and of excellent standards. BCS is committed to equip students for Christian living by instilling biblical principles of self-discipline, individual responsibility, personal integrity and good citizenship. We are located on four campuses throughout the Lehigh Valley, and are hosted by each of the four churches."

15.7 Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church and Bethlehem Christian School are two ministries with complementary purposes and objectives and thereby we see our partnership advancing the Kingdom of God and glorifying His name.

The undersigned, intending to live and work by the concepts described here-in, have executed this Agreement as of the date first written above.
